St. Louis Mosaic Project mission is to be the fastest growing area for immigrants by 2020.

#6 of top 20 now at 2.35 vs. 5% growth in Baltimore (2006-2012 ACS)

Why? Immigrants offer high economic and cultural value to any community, especially to St. Louis which will benefit from growth.



Background

St.IOU S. MOSAIC

- 150 years ago, St. Louis was the 4th largest US city.
- Today, we are 19th
 metropolitan area in US; down
 from 10th in 1970.
- City of St. Louis is so old that it is not part of the surrounding County of St. Louis.
- 9 Fortune 500 corporate headquarters; more than 20 colleges & universities

Sense of urgency:







First Stage

- 1. Community & Immigrant Engagement
 - Mosaic Ambassadors: over 350 now
 - Professional Connectors: 37 in process
 - Regional Business Council Mentorship Project
 - 11/144 international students mentored up to 22 next year
 - Women's Connector Program for Corporate ex-pat wives to engage quickly, happily (May launch, 4 already)





2. Welcoming Initiatives

- Messaging (100 stories, presentations)
 - Entrepreneurship, feature immigrants hiring
 - Population growth
 - Assets St. Louis has to offer
- Website Development
 - Focus on 11 ethnic communities
- Mobile/Pop Up Welcoming Services





Second Stage

- 1. Immigrant Entrepreneurship
- International Student/Corporate Hiring
- 3. New Campus for International Institute fall 2014
 - 1. Serves 7,500 immigrants annually including 700+ new refugees
 - 2. Will have space to expand services to higher skilled





Upcoming work: Career Paths – Health Care & Engineering

- Immigrant needs: language, cultural & academic support
- Environmental & regulatory assessment
- Capacity Building for employers
- Recruitment of candidates & employers

- Develop a plan that includes short-term and long-term goals.
- Secure funding for the initiative.
- Sustaining consensus & forward direction.
